What do you think are the most important issues facing the ACR?

What do you think are the most important issues facing the ACR?

One of the foremost concerns is the growing demand for radiologists to work efficiently and interpret a high volume of images, which can lead to burnout and stress, particularly among early career professionals. Healthcare reform, shifting payment models and increasing administrative burdens have also led to a complex and uncertain work environment for radiologists. Young radiologists often grapple with the challenge of balancing clinical duties with administrative tasks and the need to advocate for their profession's value within the healthcare system. Additionally, it is also challenging to keep pace with the continuous and rapid evolution in imaging modalities, software and artificial intelligence tools, which require ongoing education and can be both time-consuming and financially burdensome. Finally, the ongoing shortage of radiologists in certain areas of the country can lead to potential job market disparities as early career radiologists enter the workforce.

How should the ACR respond to them?

Addressing these issues requires a multiprong approach by the ACR, including continued education, advocacy efforts and promoting collaboration within the radiology community to ensure the future success and sustainability of our profession.

Reason for seeking office

This would be an opportunity for me to actively engage with my professional community and have a voice in shaping the future of my profession. It is also an opportunity to network with peers, mentors and experienced radiologists, which can lead to valuable connections, professional growth and insights into my field. ACR YPS is a way for me to not only give back to the radiology community, but also to enhance my knowledge base, skills and career opportunities.

The exponential increase in clinical volumes paired with nationwide staffing shortages; the undervaluation of education, mentorship and research as traditionally "non-RVU" producing activities.			

Rising levels of physician burnout.

Artificial intelligence: How to develop a baseline knowledge for implementation of AI (CAD, radiomics, etc.) into clinical practice, concerns over medicolegal implications, propagation of health inequity, the psychological interplay of humans working alongside machines (e.g., over-reliance on AI output), etc.

How should the ACR respond to them?

In general:

Interdisciplinary and intersociety collaboration to work towards shared goals such as through the formation of task forces and coalitions.

Advocacy: Providing education and raising awareness at the local, state and national levels on political issues relevant to the radiologic profession (for example in response to the nationwide radiologist shortage, advocacy to increase the number of residency slots or acceleration of the IMG pathway). Funding of grassroots campaigns.

Visibility through marketing campaigns, partnerships and the utilization of social media.

Drafting of expert opinion on salient topics and evidence-based guidelines for best clinical practice.

Education and empowerment of future radiology leaders. Provision of opportunities for networking, brainstorming innovative solutions and collaboration.

Reason for seeking office

As described in detail in my CV, I have served in a role of representative or liaison for my undergraduate institution, residency program and state/national ACR committees over the past 13 years. Through my most recent role as ACR-RFS intersociety representative and RLI Summit attendance, I have gained firsthand experience of the importance of member engagement and representation.
